Our ratings also help identify legislators who have courageously fought against liberal majorities. We hope that this guide helps you learn how well, or poorly, your legislators work to preserve the values we share.

MINNESOTA SENATE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS


- 1. SF 1006 Unemployment Benefits for Miners. This bill extends unemployment benefits through June 2017 for iron ore miners or those in a "related industry" who were laid off after March 14, 2015. ACU opposes singling out one group of workers for special benefits and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 10, 2016 by a vote of 62-3.
- 2. SF 3162 Propane Fees. This bill allows for a major fee increase imposed on producers and marketers of odorized propane in order to fund the Propane Education and Research Council. ACU opposes these fees that are imposed by large companies onto small companies to fund programs that benefit large companies and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 28, 2016 by a vote of 45-15.
- 3. SF 2555 Additional Dwellings on Private Property. This bill creates a new process for local governments to allow an additional dwelling on private property. Under this bill, local governments have the option of zoning for temporary use, permanent use, or opting out of the process altogether. ACU Foundation's Center for 21st Century Property Rights engages heavily on the issue of strengthening property rights for homeowners. ACU supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 2, 2016 by a vote of 50-15.
- 4. SF 2680 "Hate" Crimes. This bill increases the maximum penalty for felony assaults by 25 percent if the crime is based on the victim's race, color, sex, sexual orientation, or disability. ACU does not believe punishment for crimes should be based on what is in a person's mind and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 9, 2016 by a vote of 40-19.
- 5. SF 2405 Electric Vehicle Mandate. This bill requires every city that is classified a "first class" city and uses Xcel Energy or Minnesota Power to establish a program that promotes the purchase and use of electric vehicles in their community and build an "electric vehicle infrastructure." ACU supports all forms of energy, believes government should not favor one form of energy over another, and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 10, 2016 by a vote of 41-19.

- 6. SF 3175 Coin Dealer Regulations. This bill makes a series of reforms to draconian regulations on Bullion coin dealers that were imposed in 2013. They include easing regulations for coin shows and increasing the transaction threshold for registering with the state from \$5,000 to \$25,000. Expanding entrepreneurship promotes economic growth, which leads to greater family prosperity, as illustrated by the ACU Foundation's Family Prosperity Index. ACU supports common-sense regulatory reform and supported this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 10, 2016 by a vote of 49-9.
- 7. SF 1474 Body Art Technician License. This bill increases the requirements for obtaining a body art technician's license and adds requirements for working under someone's supervision before being allowed to perform the work themselves. When entrepreneurship is suppressed, the resulting decline in economic growth leads to a reduction in family prosperity, as illustrated by the ACU Foundation's Family Prosperity Index. ACU opposes the proliferation licenses in many states and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 11, 2016 by a vote of 52-6.
- 8. SF 3147 Senjem Amendment Fire Sprinklers Mandate. The Senjem amendment to a catch-all labor and industry bill prohibits the Department of Labor and Industry from requiring the installation of fire sprinkler systems in new or existing single family homes. ACU opposes these mandates that drive up the cost of housing for everyone and supported this amendment. The Senate passed the amendment on May 16, 2016 by a vote of 41-22.


- 1. SF 1006 Unemployment Benefits for Miners. This bill extends unemployment benefits through June 2017 for iron ore miners or those in a "related industry" who were laid off after March 14, 2015. ACU opposes singling out one group of workers for special benefits and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on March 24, 2016 by a vote of 113-17.
- 2. HF 1089 Fireworks Sales. This bill removes the long-standing prohibition on the sale of aerial and audible fireworks in the state, with some limitations. ACU supports allowing the people of Minnesota to enjoy the same right to buy fireworks that those in other states enjoy and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 11, 2016 by a vote of 73-56.
- 3. HF 2540 Legalizing Fantasy Sports. This bill clarifies the law to specifically authorize fantasy sports in Minnesota as a game of skill. ACU believes people should be able to participate in fantasy sports if they so desire and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 11, 2016 by a vote of 100-28.
- 4. HF 2749 Ward Amendment Student Surveys. The Ward amendment to the budget bill removes a prohibition against the state education commissioner proposing student surveys about substance abuse, gambling, sexual activity and the like. ACU opposes wasting the taxpayer's money on surveys that have little to do with a child's education and opposed this amendment. The House defeated the amendment on April 25, 2016 by a vote of 52-79.
- 5. HF 3931 Metsa Amendment Broadband Subsidies. The Metsa amendment to an omnibus employment and economic development bill eliminates the caps on broadband projects, which had been 50 percent of the project cost in "unserved" areas and 25 percent of the cost in "underserved areas." The bill also makes it easier for an area to be defined as "underserved." ACU opposes taxpayer-funded broadband projects that compete with private enterprise and opposed this amendment. The House defeated the amendment on April 27, 2016 by a vote of 62-69.
- 6. HF 3931 Moran Amendment Raced-Based Grant Program. The Moran amendment to the Lien amendment to an omnibus employment and economic development bill creates a \$1.5 million grant program for "women of color business development." Community activist organizations and unions are among those eligible to apply for grants. ACU believes these grant programs are problematic, creating an unneeded expansion of government and making race the sole criteria for grant designations, and opposed this amendment. The House defeated then amendment on April 27, 2016 by a vote of 55-74.

- 7. HF 3931 Johnson "C" Amendment "Affordable Housing" Program. The Johnson "C" amendment to an omnibus employment and economic development bill takes \$6 million from the Lewis and Clark Water Development Project and gives it to the Minnesota Housing Finance Agency to "set up an affordable housing program" with no specifics. ACU opposes these programs that primarily fund community-based activist organizations to "help people find affordable housing" and opposed this amendment. The House defeated the amendment on April 27, 2016 by a vote of 58-72.
- 8. HF 3467 Kiel Amendment Licensing of Abortion Clinics. The Kiel amendment to an omnibus health and human services bill requires that facilities that perform ten or more abortions per month become licensed by the state and allows the Commissioner of health to make two unannounced inspections of abortion clinics per month. ACU Foundation's Center for Human Dignity engages heavily on these issues and believes abortion is a human tragedy and supports restrictions on the practice. ACU supported this amendment. The House defeated the amendment on April 28, 2016 by a vote of 76-52.
- 9. HF 2955 American with Disability Act Regulations. This bill makes it easier for small businesses to comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act and sets requirements for discrimination claims to reduce frivolous lawsuits. ACU supports common-sense regulatory reform and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on May 9, 2016 by a vote of 82-45.
- 10. HF 2585 Protecting Local Property Rights. This bill requires a two-thirds vote of a city council or town board in order to pass an interim ordinance. The bill also requires a public hearing within 30 days of a public notice before the interim ordinance can take effect if the ordinance regulates, restricts, or prohibits activities relating to housing. ACU Foundation's Center for 21st Century Property Rights engages heavily on this issue and supports the protection of property rights. ACU supported this bill. The House passed the bill on May 11, 2016 by a vote of 82-47.
- 11. SF 2555 Additional Dwellings on Private Property. This bill creates a new process for local governments to allow an additional dwelling on private property. Under this bill, local governments have the option of zoning for temporary use, permanent use, or opting out of the process altogether. ACU Foundation's Center for 21st Century Property Rights engages heavily on the issue of strengthening property rights for homeowners. ACU supported this bill. The House passed the bill on May 11, 2016 by a vote of 113-17.

- 12. SF 3175 Coin Dealer Regulations. This bill makes a series of reforms to draconian regulations on Bullion coin dealers that were imposed in 2013. They include easing regulations for coin shows and increasing the transaction threshold for registering with the state from \$5,000 to \$25,000. Expanding entrepreneurship promotes economic growth, which leads to greater family prosperity, as illustrated by the ACU Foundation's Family Prosperity Index. ACU supports common-sense regulatory reform and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on May 17, 2016 by a vote of 68-60.
- 13. HF 2602 Privacy Protection. This bill restricts access of non-public data to federal and state law enforcement officers. If a specific purpose for data access is provided in law, then access will be limited to that purpose. ACU supports privacy protection and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on May 19, 2016 by a vote of 72-61.
- 14. HF 3585 Lillie Substitute Amendment Paycheck Protection. This bill, while approving union contracts for state employees, eliminates the automatic deduction for union fees in state payrolls. A key vote came on the Lillie substitute amendment to remove this paycheck protection provision. ACU supports the right of employees to decide for themselves how they will pay their union fees and opposed this amendment. The House defeated the amendment on May 20, 2016 by a vote of 58-73.
